

ELL Education

The parent of an English language learner can expect:

1. To have their child learn English and other subjects such as reading, writing and mathematics at the same academic level as all other students.
2. To know if their child has been identified and recommended for placement in an English language acquisition program, and to accept or refuse such placement.
3. To apply for supplemental services, such as tutoring
4. To have their child tested annually to assess his or her progress in English language acquisition
5. To receive information regarding your child's performance on academic tests
6. To have the opportunity for their child to reach his or her greatest academic potential.
7. To have an advocate at the district office to help with their child's educational needs

FIT

What does my child receive if he/she is identified as homeless?

Students automatically receive free lunch: a lunch application is NOT required to be on file with the school.

The right to immediate enrollment in school even without giving a permanent address or if lacking paperwork normally required for enrollment.

The right to attend school in the school of origin or in the school in the attendance area where the family or youth is currently residing, if the family or unaccompanied youth should choose this option.

The right to receive transportation to the school of origin, if this is requested by the parent or unaccompanied youth and is feasible.

The right to services comparable to those received by housed schoolmates, including class fees, uniforms, school supplies, etc. We also have DI vouchers for those in need of additional items.

Migrant Education

The Migrant Education Program supports educational programs for migratory children to reduce the impact of academic disruptions from repeated moves.

The Federal Programs Office offers the following assistance to Migrant families:

- Parental Advisory Committee
- Summer Programs
- Graduation Specialist
- Advocacy, school supplies, counseling or other needs
- Referrals to community based agencies and organization
